Taylor's services, and that he renominated him, and moved that he be nominated by acclamation. Col. Taylor arose and said that he saw no other course left him than to accept. He thanked the Convention for the exceedingly fiattering manner in which they had nominated him, and that in going into this fight he wished it distinctly understood that he was going in to win, and urged upon every delegate present the importance of work; he begged each one to consider himself a candi-
