Murder in Onslow.

We have the partial particulars of a horrid murder which is reported to have occurred in Onslow county, near the New Hanover line, on Thursday last. Our informant states that a white man, by the name of Atkinson, was at work in his cooper shop at that place on the day mentioned, when a difficulty arose between two colored men in the road near by.

He dropped his work and went out to separate them when one of the men, by the name of Wiley Williams, struck him on the head with a stick, inflicting a fearful wound, from the effects of which Mr. Atkinson died on Friday night. It is thought that the murderer has been arrested, but we have no positive information to that effect.
