ORNING

ROCKY POINT, N. C., June 29, 1872. In obedience to the call of their Executive Committee, the Radicals of this county held their pow-wow at this "Point" to-day-and s pow-wow it was, truly. About 10 o'clock the crowd was called into a bull-pen erected by those of the "faithful" who happened on the ground Friday evening, and called to order by James Lowrey (col.), Chairman of the Executive Committee. Mr. Heaton obtained the floor and moved that the County Executive Com.

mittee be appointed a committee on credentials, and upon this motion called the previous question, thus cutting off all debate. After the usual amount of squabbling, the motion was carried. Gee Zee, the Sage of Excelsior, then moved to take a recess of one hour, which was, of course, carried, this being s part of the programme.

After the recess, the Executive Committee alias Committee on Credentials, submitted a report, the effect of which seemed to be to rule out all contesting delegates except those in favor of Schenck for Sheriff. Everything being then one-sided, Geo. G. French was selected as Chairman and Stacy VanAmringe and Jos. C. Hill as Secretaries. The Sage of "Excelsior" then made a speech, threatening with arrest all that did not behave themselves, a considerable rumpus being in progress outside in the meantime. A squad of Deputy Sheriffs were then appointed to keep the 'commonality" out of the sacred enclosure. The Chairman now, declared nominations for Sheriff in order. Heaton, in a speech of half an hour, placed his friend J. W. Schenck. Jr., in nomination. Owen Burney nominated Gen. S. H. Manning. The Chairman then de-

cided that the rules of the House of Representatives would be observed and that the delegates would vote vive voce. H. E. Scott arose and stated that, as it was a one-sided affair and the regular delegates were ignored, he by request withdrew Gen. Manning's name. Mabson then arose and proposed that J. W Schenck be nominated by acclamation, which motion the Chair decided as carried, notwithstanding that there were several votes to the
