SENATOR WILSON IN WILMINGTON.

The Reception-The Procession to Hilton-Speeches of Wilson, Warwick

and Long-Pool Speaks a Piece. Hon, Henry Wilson, of Massachusetts, the Republican candidate for Vice President of the United States on the Grant ticket, accompanied by Senator John Pool, of this State, arrived here yesterday morning, having spoken at Wilson on the day previous. Considerable preparations had been made to receive the distinguished Radical visitors to our city, by their party friends, and at 12% o'clock, in accordance with the programme, a public reception was given them at the City Hall. At the entrance to the Hall was an arch, constructed of a large United States flag, Immediately under which was the word "Welcome," painted in large black letters. Another flag, flying in front of the Hall, or extended across the side-walk, had on it in large black letters the name of " Grant and Wilson." The City Court Room, in which the reception took place, was decorated with flags. Hon. Edward Cantwell delivered the reception address, welcoming Senator Wilson to the city, which was responded to by Mr. Wilson, who during his remarks took occasion to refer to his previous visit here some five or six years ago and complimented his audience Due by stockholders on account on the rapid advance of Wilmington on the road to prosperity since that time, after which he indulged in a little sarcastic wit at the expense of his political opponents, thanked his friends for their generous reception and took

Pool was then called upon and made a few remarks, at the conclusion of which the interesting ceremony of "hand-squeezing" took place. During this time the court-room was quite crowded, but there was an absence of that enthusiasm which was to be expected on the occasion of the visit of one who has occupied such a prominent position in national polities, and he a candidate for the Vice Presidency, too, which could not fail to attract the attention and comment of disinterested lookers on. In fact, it seemed to our mind to be the tamest affair of the kind we ever witnessed.

After the conclusion of the hand-shaking a procession was formed in front of the Hall, composed of about two or three hundred people, and marched to Hilton, where the speaking was to take place. Here Col. Thos. Long' of Salisbury, lead off in a speech of about forty minutes in length, during which he told some very amusing anecdotes, which "took" with his audience amazingly. He was followed by Senator Wilson, the "big-gun" of the day, who occupied about two hours. He admitted an intimate and long standing acquaintance with Greeley and Brown, our candidates for President and Vice President, and could find no fault with their past records, so he branched off upon the Democratic party, to which he paid his respects in manner which was to be expected of a representative of the Radical party.
