Miseral Sperm Oil.

At the invitation of Messrs. Hancock & Daggett, of this city, we witnessed at their store yesterday a test, so far as its safety is concerned, of the mineral sporm oil. It was fully demonstrated that it would stand a fire test of 300 degrees Fahrenheit, with perfect safety, the legal standard being 110 degrees. A quantity of the oil was placed in a pan, in which was a sponge saturated with the substance. Fire was applied to the sponge in the midst of the fluid and oil poured upon it while burning, without producing any explosive effect. It is claimed for the mineral sperm oil that it will not ignite under 300 degrees Fabrepheit, and consequently is absolutely sate. It will not take fire in case of breakage of the lamp, as the oil will extinguish the flame. It burns with great brilliancy, requires but little attention and no trimming, and emits no offeasive odor. It is peculiarly adapted to railroad cars, steamers, factories and dwelling houses, and in respect to economy is about as cueap as kerosene." Some interesting tests of the different qualities of oils now in use will soon be made by Messre, nancock & Daggett.
