FROM ROBESON. Further Particulars about the Killing of Lowery—The Outlaws on the War-Path—The Political Situation, &c. [Correspondence of the Morning Star.] LUMBERTON, July 23d.

Masses. Editors:—Tom Lowery, the outlaw, was killed on Saturday morning last, about 8 o'clock. A party, consisting of Strong and Bob-Wishart, Jas. McKay and Jas. Campbell, had been on his track during the night and had seen him in company with some loose women, but could not shoot without killing some of them.

Lowery run about fifty yards into the swamp and fell, to rise no more. He was on his way to Union Chapel to engage with Steve Lowery and Andrew Strong in the killing of Sheriff McMillan, which was, no doubt, frustrated by the death of Tom, as the other two were already on the ground, armed and equipped.

The political situation in this county is very encouraging. The opinion is that the Conservative ticket will be elected. Greeley is gaining daily and we have not seen but two or three Democrats who refuse to vote the Greeley and Brown ticket.

The Raleigh News learns that several colored men in that vicinity have openly declared for Greeley since the assault upon the colored Greeleyite, Cross. The Conservative State Executive Committee have appointed Hon. Z. B. Vance and Hon. T. J. Jarvis as Greeley and Brown electors for the State at large.

Mack Jones, colored, who assaulted the colored Republican, Samuel G. Cross, was bound over Saturday for his appearance at the Federal Court by Commissioner Best. Willis Jenkins, Esq., having declined the nomination that was tendered him as a Conservative candidate, in Granville, for the House, Major James T. Littlejohn has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Whose acts of usurpation and lawlessness, in regard to the penal and charitable institutions of the State caused a riot in the Penitentiary—in which the convict Hartsfield was killed? Tod R. Caldwell. Mrs. Mary Crawford, living about four miles south of Raleigh, was run over in her cow lot on yesterday morning and severely injured by two bulls that were fighting in the lot, as we learn from the News.

The News has information from a source of the highest reliability, that the Radicals propose to import negro voters from South Carolina and Tennessee to carry the State election for the Radical party in August. The Raleigh Era is much concerned about Saunders, the colored man who bolted from the Grant electoral ticket in Maryland, and who is working hard for Greeley in this State. He's able to take care of himself, Mr. Era.

Before U. S. Commissioner Best, at Raleigh, on Monday, Gabriel Hogg and Primus Haywood, two more of the conspirators, charged with a violation of the 5th section of the enforcement act in an assault upon Samuel G. Cross, colored, for the purpose of intimidating him because he had expressed a determination to vote for Greeley, had a hearing. The former was bound over in the sum of \$500 and the latter in \$1,000, for their appearance at the next term of the Circuit Court. The most encouraging news reaches us from all parts of the State as to the canvass and prospects. The Sentinel says: We sincerely believe we shall carry the State by at least 8,000 majority, and if the vote should be full, by a much larger one, say from 12,000 to 20,000. We happen to know that Judge Merrimon expects the majority will be very large, probably attaining to the last named figure.
