The Oath at Registration.

When a person is challenged the judges shall explain to him the qualifications of a voter and if he insists that he is qualified and he challenge is not withdrawn he shall adminster to him the oath embodying the following points: Citizenship of the United States, wenty-one years old, resided in the State twelve months, county thirty days next preceding the election, not disqualified by the Constitution and laws of this State, name as written on the registration book, in such name registered as a voter of the township and an actual resident of the same, not voted at after such oath the judges may reject such person's vote if they are satisfied from record evidence, or their own knowledge, or other legal testimony adduced that he is not a legal voter, and they are authorized to administer the necessary oath to witnesses.
