Registration in the Second Ward shows a total of 60 whites and 44 colored, up to yesterday evening.
The river was rising a little at Fayetteville when the Gos. Worth left yesterday morning, but it is still very low.
The alarm of fire last night, was caused by the burning of a chimney at the corner of Eleventh and Princess streets.
The Chairman of the Conservative Canvassers for each Ward will please call at the City office this afternoon for tickets.
It is rumored that a horse race for a \$100 purse will probably come off at the Fair Grounds in about ten days.
There will be a meeting at the Ollford House this evening, for the purpose of forming a Greeley & Brown Club.
Passengers down the road yesterday report no further trouble at Wadeboro' since the quelling of the riot on Saturday.
In the sub division of the First Ward, up to yesterday evening, the books show a total registration of 98 whites and 332 colored.
We were glad to meet Capt. George Morrison, who has been sojourning for a brief season at Beaufort, on our streets yesterday.
A white man, slightly "elevated" by a too free indulgence in stimulating beverages, was arrested and taken to the Guard House yesterday afternoon.
The British Brig Fair and Easy arrived here yesterday from Newport, England, with a cargo of iron for the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta Railroad.
Abbott, Rutherford Isaac Myers, and J. P. Sampson, Editor of the Colored Citizen, published at Washington City, will speak at the City Hall to-night.
Judge Russell has notified the Governor of his inability to be present and hold the special term Mecklenburg Superior Court, to begin on the 8th of August.
Mr. Janus Davis has been appointed Inspector of Elections in place of Captain J. L. Boatwright, and Mr. DeBruts Cutlar in place of Maj. J. D. Poisson, in the Second Ward.
Some thief prized open the window of Capt. J. M. Wise's cigar manufactory, opposite the Court House, on Saturday night last, and stole about fifteen hundred cigars. No clue to the thief.
Capt. F. M. Wooten, who has been quite ill at his residence in Columbus county for several days past, has, we are glad to learn, sufficiently recovered to resume his place on the road.
We learn that there was but little barbecue and much fighting at the Radical demonstration in Harnett Township on Monday. The enthusiasm of the crowd was like their stomachs, mighty empty and weak.
The steamer Hurl, which has been laid up at Fayetteville for some weeks past, arrived here yesterday. She has been thoroughly overhauled from stem to stern, and is more staunch and presents a handsomer appearance than ever before.
The building destroyed by the Radical incendiaries in Charlotte on Wednesday was insured for \$2,000—\$1,000 in the London and Liverpool and Globe and \$1,000 in the N. C. Home. Mr. Thomas Grame, the Agent of the former Company in this city, with his usual promptitude, immediately made arrangements for adjusting the insurance. The loss amounted to about \$1,200.
Sudden Death.
During the latter part of last week an elderly lady, living about three miles from North-east Bridge, in this county, came to this city to undergo medical treatment for that terrible disease, cancer in the throat. She stopped at the residence of Mrs. Rowe on Walnut, between Fourth and Fifth streets, and a physician was summoned to attend her. Early yesterday morning, as usual, he called to see his patient, and was informed by the family that he would find her in her room, where she had lain down to rest. He entered the room and upon going to the bedside of the unfortunate lady he discovered that the spirit had flown—the body was cold and stiff in death. She had been released from her terrible sufferings, and quietly passed away without the knowledge of any one around her. Breaking into an Auction Store—Arrest of the Perpetrator—Recovery of a Fortune of the Goods.
Ben Lipscomb, an old offender against the laws, was arrested on Monday night, by Officer John Evangelist, charged with effecting an entrance into the store of Messrs. Bunting & McQuinn and stealing a quantity of goods. It appears that Lipscomb went through an alley into the rear of the store, where he managed to get into the second story window. To accomplish this he procured a hoghead, which he placed under the window, and on this he placed successively a box, a barrel and a keg, so that he could very readily make his way from one to the other. Standing on the keg he was enabled to reach the window, a glass from which he removed, when he could easily undo the fastenings and enter. He removed about \$75 worth of goods and had commenced carrying them off when, in going out of the alley into the street with a number of articles under his arms, he accidentally encountered a policeman. The officer's suspicions were aroused and he attempted to halt the thief. The latter, however, took to his heels, pursued by the officer, and finally escaped. The officer then sent for one of the proprietors, upon whose arrival the suggestion was made that Evangelist should conceal himself in the vicinity of the store, as in all probability the thief would return after a while for more of his plunder. This advice was taken and he had not long to wait before he heard some one approaching. He screened himself from observation in the rear of a street lamp and quietly awaited the movements of the individual, who commenced puring about as if in search of something. The officer, as soon as he was satisfied that the man was none other than the thief, suddenly pounced upon the offender and took him under arrest. The thief, who proved to be Lipscomb, as soon as he espied the officer, pretended to be so intoxicated that he could not stand up, but officer Evangelist gave him to understand that the dodge was "too thin" and he was marched off to the Guard House. There were others, doubtless, implicated in the affair, but no clue has been obtained to lead to their detection. Lipscomb was arraigned before the Mayor's Court yesterday morning and required to give security in the sum of \$300 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court, in default of which he was turned over to the Sheriff and committed to jail.

How it Was in Onslow.
The intimidation alluded to in the 2d as having been practiced on the Radical orators who were sent down to Onslow amounted simply to this: They were met on every occasion by one or two Conservative speakers, who gave them such a "raking down" in the way of old fashioned Democratic argument that they got sick and came home in disgust. This and nothing more, as we have it on good authority.

Bound Over.
The case of James Heaton, charged with making an assault upon Mr. Smith, bar-tender of the Germania Saloon, on Friday night last, came up for a hearing before Justice Woodford yesterday. Heaton pleaded guilty and was bound over in the sum of \$300 for his appearance at the next term of the Superior Court.

The Radical Barbecue and Speaking at Dudley's Grove.
The Radical gathering at Dudley's Grove, yesterday afternoon, was addressed by Rutherford, Cantwell, Heaton, Mabson and Hill. J. P. Sampson was called upon, but excused himself. The crowd consisted of four or five hundred, the most of whom were women and children. We learn that those who went for the purpose of "getting something good to eat" came away disappointed. One old colored man, in reply to a question about the barbecue, said: "I didn't get near enough to taste it, but I got near enough to smell it!" We learn that several slight disturbances occurred upon the grounds.

Closing of Bar-rooms, etc., on Election To-Morrow.
Mayor Wilson gives notice in this issue that all bar-rooms, or places where liquors are retailed, within the city limits, or within one mile thereof, must be closed and remain so from 8 o'clock this evening until 6 o'clock Friday morning, under a penalty of a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1,000. The strictest attention should be paid to this matter, as we learn that detectives will be on the lookout for offenders.
