For Mayor—Merrimon, 104; Caldwell, 375. The balance of the vote not counted.

For Governor—Merrimon 296, Caldwell, 237. For Lieutenant Governor—Hughes, 295; Howerton, 235. All the State ticket received the same vote as the candidates for Lieut. Governor.

The following are the returns received by special telegrams to the STAR and from other sources up to the hour of going to press:

BLADEN COUNTY.
ABSTRACTING TOWNSHIP.—Majority for Merrimon. Vote not given. Conservatives gain over vote of 1870.

DUPLIN.
FABON'S.—Reported Conservative gain of 23 votes.

WARREN.—For Governor—Merrimon, 184; Caldwell, 143. State ticket Democratic same as Merrimon all through! Radical same as Caldwell all through. For Senators from Duplin and Wayne, Wm. A. Allen (Dem.) 178; Humphrey, 123. Pearson (Rad.) 147; Fussell, 141.

Later returns from this county have no doubt of the election of Allen and Humphrey. A dispatch from Magnolia says: The election in this township went overwhelmingly Conservative. The vote of 1870 stood 175 for Shipp and 109 for Phillips. To-day the vote for Waddell is 215; for McKay 121. Allen and Humphrey ran ahead of the opposition by nearly a hundred. For Governor the vote is 218 for Merrimon and 121 for Caldwell.

HALIFAX.
WILSON.—Democratic gain at this township of 65, showing a falling off in the Radical vote of 46. Twelve Conservative negroes voted. No reports from the county.

Enfield Township gives Merrimon 246 votes and Caldwell 643—a Democratic gain of 75.

A later dispatch from Weldon says: The vote has been counted and shows a Conservative gain over Shipp's vote of 120. No county estimate yet. There is a Radical falling off of 77. There is a Conservative gain of 75 at Seaboard and 35 at Magnolia (Duplin). Hallen, Rocky Mount, Whitaker, Enfield and Battleboro give heavy Conservative gains.

NORTHAMPTON.
Large Conservative gains reported in this county. Twenty colored men voted with us as one precinct.

BRUNSWICK.
Town Creek gives Merrimon 140 and Caldwell 352. Conservative gain of 84.

NEW HANOVER.
Rocky Point.—The vote in this township has been counted as follows: Merrimon, 109; Caldwell, 285; Waddell, 208; McKay, 320. In Blugow, Holly township, the vote stood

for Merrimon 65 and Caldwell 82. For Congress, Waddell 55; McKay 63.

The returns from the county are very meagre and incomplete, but sufficient is known to indicate that the vote will be very close.

EDGECOMBE.
At Maser Hill there is a Democratic gain of 78. In one township near Rocky Mount there is a Democratic gain of 49. There is a Democratic gain in Rocky Point township of 31.

A dispatch from Tarboro says: Five townships heard from in this county give a net Democratic gain of 150 over Shipp's vote.

GRANVILLE.
A dispatch from Kittrell's says: The vote here stands as follows: For Governor—Merrimon, 161; Caldwell, 232. For Congress—Rogers, 148; Smith, 231. A Conservative gain of about 15 over the election of 1870.

In Henderson the vote stood: Merrimon, 284; Caldwell, 354; Rogers, 225; Smith, 353. The Conservative vote the same as Shipp's in 1870.

COLUMBUS.
Williams Township gives Ellis 140, Norment 31, Richardson 121, Williamson 21. Cerro George Township gives Williamson 54 and Norment 24 ahead. Whitville Township will go about 50 or 100 Conservative. Nothing definite from Whitville.

Bogue township gives McKay 100 majority. A Radical gain of 50. The State ticket is about the same, but is not counted.

NASH.
Liberty Township gives a Democratic gain of 30.

WILSON.
The Democrats carry the town of Wilson by 75 majority—a gain. Wilson county will give a Democratic majority of 300.

Unofficial returns indicate 150 majority in this county. Shipp, Merrimon and Kitcher (Democrats) 983; Hargrove, Caldwell and Thomas (Radicals) 829. Three precincts to hear from, which gave 40 Conservative majority in 1870. Pat down Wilson county for 200 majority.

WAYNE.
Nahata township gives the Republicans 28 majority. Holden township gives a Democratic majority of 20, a Republican gain.

A dispatch says: The election passed off quietly at the different voting precincts in the county. Goldsboro township gave Merrimon 408; Caldwell 526, a Democratic gain. For the Senate, Humphrey 417; Allen, 403; Pearson, (Radical) 523; Fussell (Radical) 510. The result in the county will be close.

WAKE.
A dispatch from Raleigh says: Voting is progressing quietly. The Democratic vote will be increased. There has been no disturbance. Returns from 11 towns and precincts give a Conservative gain of about 950 over the Shipp vote of 1870. Raleigh township gives a Conservative gain of 218 and Wake Forest 100. Nothing as yet definite, though the chances are in favor of Merrimon.

ORANGE.
The day passed off quietly. The vote at Hillsboro stands as follows: Merrimon, 285; Caldwell, 378. For Congress, Rogers, 283; Smith, 327. A small gain for the Republicans over the vote of 1870. At Douglass the vote stood Merrimon, 78; Caldwell, 50; Rogers, 78; Smith, 33.

WARREN.
Good news from Warren. A gain in every precinct. Merrimon will poll over a thousand votes. There is a supposed Democratic gain of 200, and a Radical loss of over 200.

CABARRUS.
Eight of twelve townships have been heard from, in which Merrimon's majority is 237, a gain of 205 on Shipp's vote. For Congress, Aah's majority is 244, a gain of 288 on Shipp's vote. For House of Representatives Shinn's (Con.) majority is 237. For the Senate Barnhardt's (Con.) majority is 7. The county ticket is all right. The other four townships will probably increase the Conservative majority.

GENERAL NEWS.
A dispatch from Raleigh says: The election news so far is very meagre, but good. There is a general gain on the vote of Shipp in 1870. Will send you all the news I have in the morning. Smith's majority in this town is 568, but there are Conservative gains in the county.

A later dispatch from Raleigh says: Conservative gain at Weldon 101. Gain in Davidson on Shipp, 40. Henderson, Granville county, gives a Democratic gain of 5. Mecklenburg gives a Democratic majority of 260, a gain of 95. Rowan gives 50 majority, a gain on Shipp. Nash county gives a considerable gain on Shipp. In Wilson there is a reported loss of 40, as far as heard from. Wilson and Nash elect the Democratic ticket. In Craven there is a reported gain of 280 for the Republicans on Shipp's vote. Edgecombe gives a gain of 260 for the Democrats as far as heard from.

A later dispatch says: Goldsboro's gives a Democratic gain of 120. In Greensboro the Republicans gain 49. The county will go Conservative.

There is a small Democratic gain at Kittrell's and Henderson, in Granville. The Democratic gain about 60 in Wake as far as heard from. The Conservatives gain 59 at High Point. Newbern gives a Conservative gain. The Radical loses at James City, near Newbern, 200. Rowan goes Conservative by about 450 majority. In Mecklenburg there is a Democratic gain of 14, as far as heard from. The county will be about 200 Democratic. Considerable Democratic gains as far as heard from in Northampton, Halifax and Edgecombe. In one township in Franklin Rogers gains 11 on his former vote. The same gives a Democratic gain of 11 on Shipp's vote. Company Shops, Alamance, gives a Conservative gain of 83. Liberty Township, Nash county, gives a Democratic gain of 85; also 31 at Rocky Mount. A later dispatch says: Wilson county will go Democratic by about 200. Warren gives a Democratic gain of 200.
