CUMBERLAND.

A letter from a friend at Fayetteville gives the following glorious news from old Cumberland: We have carried Cumberland county by an increased majority over the Shipp vote, probably by 150 majority, certainly by 100 - These are the indications.
Another friend at Fayetteville says: "I write merely to say that I have no doubt but we have carried the county by from 100 to 150 votes. Hurrah for old Cumberland!"
A friend at Lenoir writes: "This township makes a Conservative gain of 25 over the Shipp and Phillips vote two years ago. Nothing definite from the precincts yet, only that at 10 o'clock Morven reports indicated a considerable gain there - our gallant Sheriff leading the ticket by a full 'length.' Vote here the largest ever polled. Later intelligence gives the vote of Wadesboro as follows: Ashe's majority 12, Bennett's 10, Merrimon's 5 - a gain of 28. At Lenoirville Merrimon's majority is 10, a gain of 25; Ashe's 5, McCauley's 8, Bennett's 7 and Wall's 16 - a net gain of 23."

COLUMBUS.

There is a gain for Waddell and Merrimon in Welches' township of 54 over Shipp's vote.
ROBESON.
The vote at Shoe Heel was as follows: McMillan 66, Townsend 90, Smith 65, Hayes 91, Ward 65, Proctor 91, D. McMillan 156, Collins 55, Flowers 91, Commissioners 86 to 90 - State 64 to 92. Ellis 63, Norman 91, Captain Norman 64. Tom McNeill 63, Sinclair 91, Nat McLean 80.
ROCKINGHAM.
Returns from twenty-seven counties indicate positively the election of Merrimon, Conservative candidate for Governor, 8 out of 9 Congressmen and 60 majority on joint ballot in the Assembly, thereby electing a Conservative U. S. Senator in place of John Pool, Republican. The Republicans give up the election, the only question being that of the majorities. The election was quiet and orderly throughout the State. The contest in the 4th District as yet is doubtful, though chances favor Rogers, Conservative, as it also the case in the 1st District. The probabilities are that seven Conservative Congressmen will be elected.

ROCKINGHAM.

Rockingham gives considerable Conservative gains.
CASWELL.
A telegram says the Caswell county ticket is reported elected. The State ticket is doubtful in Caswell. The returns indicate the defeat of Settle for Congress.
Caswell county gives Settle 40 majority, but elects the county Conservative ticket, a Conservative gain of about 400. There is a grand ratification meeting here to-night and salutes are being fired in honor of the Conservative victory. Hurrah for Caswell!
HALIFAX.
The vote in Enfield township is as follows: Caldwell 61, Merrimon, 246. Brinkleyville township, Caldwell 406, Merrimon, 195.
A later dispatch says: We have gained 480 over Shipp's vote in this county. Well done for Halifax!

ALAMANCE.

A dispatch from High Point says: James town precinct gave Merrimon 120, Caldwell 88, Leach 127, Settle 92. High Point precinct gave Merrimon 140, Caldwell 143, Leach 137, Settle 152 - a gain over the vote of 1870 of about 40 votes for the Conservatives.
WILSON, FRANKLIN AND NASH.
A dispatch from Wilson says: Shipp's Majority 172, Merrimon's 167, Kitchener's (for Congress) 167. This is official. Franklin gives 80 majority for the Radicals. Durham and Davis, Democrats, for the Senate from Wilson, Franklin and Nash are elected by 85 majority. This county polls 103 more than is called for by the census of 1870.

GENERAL NEWS.

A dispatch from Raleigh says: The returns come very slowly, but the gains so far are so regular and general that I have no fears of the State ticket. We shall have from 5,000 to 7,000 majority. Most probably Cumberland has gained and Davidson lost. Leach is probably elected, Rogers in doubt. The East has done most nobly. Gains everywhere, and I hope to hear equally good accounts from the West.
A dispatch from Rocky Mount says: Pitt gives 15 Radical majority, Nash reported 18 Conservative majority, Edgewood 38 Conservative majority, Warren gives large Conservative gains. Carter is said to be safe in the 1st and no doubt about Rogers in the 4th Congressional District.
A dispatch from Newbern says: Greene gives 18 Conservative majority, a Conserva-



live gain of 51; Crozer gives 1,575 Radical majority, a Radical gain of 30.
A dispatch from Salisbury says: The following are the majorities as far as heard from: Budcombe 450, Burke 171, Caldwell 509, Davis 176, Catawba 899, Mecklenburg 870, McDowell 225, Cabarrus 850, Yates 246, Lincoln 220, Union 300, Stanly 900, Rowan 527.
A dispatch from Washington says: Major will and contradictory dispatches have been received here from North Carolina. The indications at this hour are 10,000 majority for Merrimon and seven Congressmen. A dispatch from Greensboro reports gains from the West. Agents have been cautioned to be very careful and the Raleigh dispatch dated at 3 o'clock may be regarded as safe.
