RETURNS RECEIVED!

NEW HANOVER.

GRANT TOWNSHIP. For Governor, Merrimon 124; Caldwell 140. Lieutenant Governor, Hughes 124; Brogden 140.

CUMBERLAND.

The following is the official vote of Cumberland county: Merrimon 1,890; Caldwell 1,838; Hughes 1,889; Brogden 1,882.

WARREN.

Warren gained 230 for the Conservatives.—She voted 1,200 for Merrimon.

JOHNSTON.

This county gives the Conservatives 250 majority, with one precinct to hear from, which will increase it to 290.

CARTERET.

All but one precinct heard from. Waddell's majority will be about 324.

DUPLIN.

This county goes Conservative by 700 majority, a gain over Shipp's vote of 147.

MECKLENBURG.

The following is the official vote of Mecklenburg: For Governor—Merrimon, 2,511; Caldwell, 2,261; Hughes, 2,509; Brogden, 2,261.

FORSYTH AND STOKES.

Caldwell carries Forsyth county by about 60 majority, the same as for Shipp. Stokes gives about 300 Democratic majority.

STANLY.

We learn unofficially, through a friend at Wadeboro, from Stanly, that Merrimon's majority at Albemarle is 200 and at Norwoods 93, a considerable gain, and it is anticipated that the county will go at least 400 majority for Merrimon.

RICHMOND.

The vote in this county is as follows: Merrimon, 1,010; Caldwell, 1,309. Ashe, 975; Dockery, 1,338. Long (Rad.) and Fletcher (col.) Radical, to the Senate and House.

ROWAN.

The following is the vote in Rowan: For Governor—Merrimon, 1,655; Caldwell, 1,118. Merrimon's majority 537. For Congress—Robbins, 1,576; Forches, 1,114. Robbins' majority 463. Price, Conservative, is elected Senator from Rowan and Davis, over Ramsay, Radical, by 634 majority, including the vote in Davis. Lucky and Craige, Conservative, are elected to the House by 400 to 500 majority.

CHATHAM.

A friend writing from Pittsboro says: Our county all heard from except one precinct and we have that unofficially. Merrimon's majority will be about 95. Legislative ticket all elected Democratic by 100 to 120 majority. Rogers runs about with the State ticket. London, Dem., is defeated for Treasurer.

ANSON.

The election returns from this county are all in except one township, and the following is the result: Merrimon, 1054; Caldwell, 946. Ashe, 1077; Dockery, 956. McAuley, Con., for Senate, 27th District, 1064; Caraway, Rad., 941. House of Representatives—Bennett, Con., 1063; Boggan, Rad., 948. Sheriff—Wall, Con., 1249; Willoughby, Rad., 700. The vote for other county officers about in same proportion as in Governor's election. There will be a gain of about 100 over last vote. Since writing the above we have the following official, which is the aggregate majority in this county:

Disreputable.
