On Friday night a number of the soldiers of the garrison at Smithville got on a drunken spree, during which the sutler, a man by the name of Jake Dinsmore, seized a heavy oaken billet, about twenty inches in length, and atruck one Tilston, a private, two severe blows on the head, which resulted in his death.
