A dispatch from Raleigh, received at a late hour last night, concedes Caldwell's election by 1,000 majority, with Ashe and Yancey to beat from. These counties gave us 444 majority in 1870.
It may appear that we are beaten in our State ticket; if so, we are beaten by the almighty frauds that ever were practiced on a people. These frauds must be looked into. Many have been reported. Reported Defeat of Merrimon for Governor.
RALEIGH, Aug. 7.
The official and positive returns are pretty well in, the Western counties, with the exception of Ashe and Yancey, having been heard from. Caldwell is elected by about 100 majority. The increased vote will amount to some 800 or 1,000. The Democrats claim that there have been great frauds and it is thought the matter will be contested. The Radicals will jubilate to-morrow night. The excitement has subsided and the Democrats receive the news of their defeat quietly.

The Petersburg Index has the following:
RALEIGH, August 6.
In the gubernatorial contest, the vote is very close. The Democrats claim that there will not be 300 difference either way. The Republicans claim Caldwell's election by 1,000 majority. The same mountain counties which are Democratic are yet to be heard from.

—The Rutherfordton Vindicator informs us that a small colored boy of that place, named Lewis, was shot and killed by the careless handling of a loaded pistol in the hands of another boy.

—Col. Bunting, the Ten Pin champion of the Raleigh Typographical Union, has received the cup won by him on the occasion of the late anniversary celebration at Kittrell's Springs.

—The oldest voter in the State, says the Robesonian, is Thomas Shaw, colored, of Lumberbridge township, who is now 108 years of age; and though now nearly blind, he rode five miles to the precinct last Thursday and voted the entire Conservative ticket. "Tom" has distinct recollections of the war of '76; often speaks of seeing the "red coats."

—Sunday night the residence of Mr. J. L. His bill consisted of two items: Hire of horse and cart used in hauling the body to Scuffletown, for which he claims \$3.00; digging grave, the compensation for which he was willing to leave to the discretion of the Commissioners. It is needless to say the whole claim was disallowed.
