RALBIGH, Aug. 7. The official and positive returns are pretty well in, the Western countles, with the exception of Ashe and Yancey, having been heard from. Caldwell is elected by about 100 majority. The increased vote will amount to some 800 or 1,000. The Democrate claim that there have been great frauds and it is thought the matter will be contested. The Radicals will jubilee to-morrow night. The excitement has subsided and the Democrate receive the news of their defeat quietly.

RALBIGH, August 6. In the gubernatorial contest, the vote is very

The Legislature all Right-Good Bye, Pool.

The following we clip from the Raleigh News. This is "glory enough for one day": The next Senate, as at present estimated. will stand 30 Conservatives and 18 Republi-

cans, with two doubtful districts to hear from The House of Representatives, as far as heard from and estimated, stands 65 Democrats and 54 Republicans, and one doubtful.

It is safe to say that the two houses will stand as follows: Senate, 31 Conservatives and 19 Republicans; House, 65 Conservatives and 55 Republicans. Majority on joint ballot 22, though some one or two of the counties to hear from may have elected Republican members. The majority on joint ballot cannot be less than 20. This will most effectually settle the fate of Mr. Pool, and for this the people of the State will be thankful, notwithstanding other losses that may have been sustained.

An Arrest and Attempt at Bescue-Almost a Riot.

Yesterday a white man by the name of Jackson, a watchman at the Union Depot, arrested a colored man whom he had reason to know had been guilty of stealing a quantity of peaches. In conjunction with his duties as watchman, Mr. Jackson is authorized in case of necessity to perform the duties of a policeman, and wears a badge. Having what he considers conclusive proof of the guilt of the colored man alluded to he proceeded to take him to the Guard House; but on his way, and when passing near the corner of Second and Market streets, he was surrounded by a crowd of colored men, who demanded the release of the prisoner, claiming that he had no right to arrest him, as he was not an authorized officer. Mr. Jackson called on Constable Hill to protect him in the discharge of his cuty which he did, and Mr. Jackson proceeded with his prisoner. He was fellowed, however, by a crowd of colored men, and when in the vicinity of the City Hall another attempt at rescue was made, which was met by a determined resistance on the part of Constable Hill, who endeavored to explain to them that Mr. Jackson had authority to sustain him in what he was doing. The two officers finally succeeded in getting the prisoner into the Guard House, but the crowd continued in the vicinity for sometime, clamorous for the release of the prisoner and emphatic in their declarations that the man had no right to arrest him. Such scenes as the above on the public streets should be put an end to, as they can be productive only of evil. If the colored people consider that injustice is being done to one of their race let them appeal to the law for redress and not put the law at defiance by taking the matter into their own hands. We want no riotous proceedings on our streets, and we hope, for the good name of the city, that the more orderly and intelligent of our colored people may frown down all such attempts as that of yesterday and endeavor to prevent such demonstrations in future.

Fraudulent Voting, &c.

We learn that in Robinson's precinct, Brunswick county, there were 83 more votes cast in the late election than there were voters on the registration books, and that after the trick had been discovered an attempt was made by representatives of the "party of great moral ideas" to alter the books to correspond. This is in keeping with the trick at the First Ward polls in this city, where, we are reliably informed, nineteen colored men registered on election day who could give no justifiable excuse for their failure to do so before, in direct violation of one of the provisions of the elec-
