

MYSTERIOUS BANK ROBBERY.

The First National Bank of Council Bluffs Robbed of \$20,000 in Broad Daylight.

One of the boldest, most daring and mysterious robberies that ever took place was perpetrated in this city on Monday.

In answer to our inquiries the officers of the bank informed us that they knew nothing of the robbery until about half-past 5 o'clock Monday evening.

Sometime in the forenoon the cashier sent his book-keeper, Mr. A. T. Rice, out to make collections, while he remained to attend upon the patrons of the institution.

The loss of the above amount of money is a heavy blow to the bank, but the managers assure the public that none but themselves shall lose anything by the occurrence.

The facts of the robbery, as far as known, were at once put into the hands of detectives, who are now busily engaged in endeavoring to solve the great mystery in which the whole affair is shrouded.

Killing of Major Randolph.

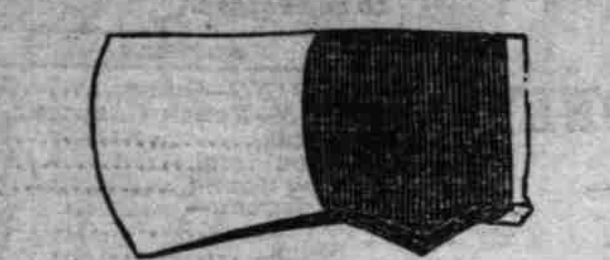
