White Men Assaulted at Night on the Public Streets. On Thursday night last, about 11 o'clock, Dr. J. E. Winants, who resides on Market, between Sixth and Seventh streets, was aroused by loud and threatening language in the street, and upon listening he recognized the voice of a colored man by the name of John Moseley, alias "Stuttering John," who was using threats of violence towards some one, and immediately thereafter the sound of blows were heard, followed by cries of murder, &c. Dr. Winants hastened to the rescue and found extended on the ground a white man from one of the Sounds by the name of Thomas Thompson, and a short distance off, retreating from the scene of the conflict, was Mosely and one or two confederates. Mr. Thompson had several severe wounds about the face and head. from which the blood was flowing very freely. He was removed to the Doctor's piazza, his wounds dressed and quarters given him until morning, when he was able to return home. About an hour after the above occurrence, and just as the Dr. was getting comfortably settled in bed, he was again, aroused by cries of "murder," "help," &c., proceeding from the street in front of his residence. He dressed himself as hastily as possible and went out, when he found a neatly dressed young man, a stranger, standing at his gate, who informed the Doctor that three colored men had made an assault upon him, evidently with the purpose of robbery, and had threatened his life if he resisted or made any outery. Not heeding their threats, however, he yelled at the top of his voice, when the villains, hearing the approach of Dr. Winants, ran off. The Dr. falled to recognize any of the party, though he saw them as they were making As the young man did not care to venture to his hotel he was provided with a bed by Dr. W. until the next morning.
