make gains everywhere, and there is no telling how extensive they may be.

Reporter. How about Maine?

General Banks. We will make large gains in Maine on Congressmen and on the Governor's vote. I do not say that we will carry it, nor do I say that we will lose it. In Connecticut and New Hampshire everything looks as favorable as we could wish. Reporter. I notice, General, that your late political associates express a poor opinion of you since your letter declaring for

Mr. Greeley. General Banks. I am told so. I have not looked at the papers myselt. It might be expected, however.

Reporter. In what light do you regard LADIES DRESS GOODS

the election in North Carolina? General Banks. I look upon it as a complete victory. Had the administration carried it by ten or twenty thousand majority they might have had some hope; but as it is all is up with them. They might as well give it up.

Reporter. Then you are sanguine of Mr. Greeley's election.

General Banks. Undoubtedly I am .-There is nothing to prevent and everything to make it certain. I do not entertain the slightest doubt of Mr. Greeley's triumph-

Randolph approached the pit from an opposite direction, and seeing the pit empty and the smoke ascending from the tuse, turned to run, but was too late, for just then the powder exploded, and a rock struck him on the back, throwing him some fifty feet forward, falling with his face on tragments of rock."

Mr. Goodloe, of North Carolina, a member of the Liberal National Committee, arrived here to-day. He says that there is no doubt but that the Legislature will award the gubernatorial chair to Mr. Merrimon at its meeting on the third Monday in November, as evidence of fraud and illegal voting sufficient has been collected to destroy Caldwell's alleged majority. He states that numbers of colored men from other States were registered and voted like cattle, and that they came in the State via the Dismal Swamp canal. It is openly charged here that the Board of Public Works of this District sent 900 colored "repeaters" to vote in the recent North Carolina election.

They then opened the door, and as she stepped in the doorway was struck in the temple with a rock and knocked insensible. She died in two hours. King was arrested, but the others have not been captured. Mrs. Blackwood was connected with some families in Virginia and with prominent people in Sullivan county.
