For the Ladies.

To soften the hands fill a wash-basin half full of fine white sand and soap-suds hot as can be borne. Wash the hands in this five minutes at a time, brushing and rubbing them in the sand. Rinse in warm lather of fine soap, and after drying rub the hands in dry bran or corn meal. Dust them, and finish with rubbing cold cream well into the skin. The best is the flint sand, or the white quartz sold for filters. It may be used repeatedly by pouring the water away from each washing and adding fresh to keep from blowing about. This effectually removes the roughness caused by housework, and should be used every day.

The South Carolina Radical bolters re-convened on the 26th, Judge Orr in the Chair. After some speechmaking the following ticket was announced as the choice of theConvention:

Comptroller-General-J. Scott his Post after an absence of two or three Freeman, Anderson. Adjutant and Inspector-General-

Phillip E. Ezekiel, (colored) Beaufort. Superintendent of Education-B. L. Roberts, (colored) Greenville. Congressman at Large-Joseph

Quash, (colored) Aiken. Mr. Earle, of Greenville, offered a resolution endorsing the nomination of Grant and Wilson, and declaring that as it was unnecessary to have two sets of Republican electors, therefore that this Convention adopt as their nominees for Presidential electors the persons named for that position by the Republican Convention held at the State House.

Objection was made against the resolution, and it was urged that otherwise Greeley electors may be

The resolution was adopted, and the platform, (recently reported by the Courier) was taken up and adopted, with additional resolutions providing for the encouragement of industries within our borders, mutual protection for labor and capital.

At the evening session Mr. Earle resented an address to the people of the State. This condemns the extravagant and ruinous taxation, the fraudulent issue of bonds, and the criminal concealment and false exhibits of the debt on the part of the public officials. It recites that frauds wrung from the people out of their hard earnings have been shamelessly and fraudulently misapplied, so as to have made the Government in South Carolina, under the name of Republicanism, a disgrace to any civilized age. It alludes to the alleged bribery and corruption openly practiced by the officers of the State Government, and to the Pay Certificates Armed Force and Land Commission frauds, and the spoilations in the Treasand money of the peopie. It made the Government of the State odious in every section of the country; those who have perpetrated these wrongs have stolen the garb of Republicanism to serve their own greed and private enrichment. The duty is to pacify the party, and regenerate the State Government. It condemns the nominees of the other party as not entitled either to credit or support, and recommends their own to the support of the people, and appealed for this purpose to the voters of the State. The address was unanimously adopted.

The Convention then elected a State Executive Committee, with a view to a thorough organization and canvass, consisting of C. C. Bowen, W. R. Jervey, D. T. Corbin, Samuel Lee, B. F. Whittemore, W. J. Whipper, Jas. L. Orr, Samuel T. Poineer. Thanks were tendered to Gov. Orr, who returned his acknowledgments and predicted a triumph.

The Convention adjourned sine die. The Moses faction resolved itself into a party of reform, (?) appointed electors and Executive Committee and adjourned.
