WAY NOTES.

We returned last night from a five days' visit in Granville, Wake, and Wayne counties.

The people of Henderson, Granville county, a pleasant and lively town on the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad, are busily preparing for the approaching Fair.

Cotton has supplanted tobacco as the staple crop of lower Granville. As elsewhere the cotton crops of the Henderson section have suffered to some extent from drouth.

We noticed local improvements of importance in Henderson. That place, it will be remembered, was almost entirely destroyed by fire in May, 1870.

Raleigh had no unusual excitement. There were no conventions, no theatricals, no Legislature. It was rather early for politics to "rage," but considerable interest was manifested in the approaching elections in Pennsylvania, Indiana and Ohio.

Raleigh is a growing city, and its prosperity is based on a solid foundation. The establishment and maintenance of schools of high grade make the beautiful and thriving "City of Oaks" an important literary centre.

The health of the capital city has not suffered unusually this season from sickness, as some of the State papers have reported.

We found quite a number of our Wilmington families stopping at the Yarborough House, which has been, under the proprietorship of Dr. Black-nall, a popular resort for travellers and pleasure seekers.

From what our Local terms "Wake Court House" we turned our face homeward, resting four hours in the bustling little city of Goldsboro. This metropolis of a belt of counties is fast getting over the effects of its disastrous fires.
