If you have been picking or handling any acid fruit and have stained your hands, wash them in clear water, wipe them lightly and while they are yet moist strike a match and shut your hands around it so as to catch the smoke, and the stain will disappear. If you have stained your gingham or muslin dress or white pants, with berries, before wetting the cloth with anything else, pour boiling water through the stains and they will disappear. Before fruit juice dries it can often be removed by cold water, using a sponge or towel, if necessary. Rubbing the fingers with the inside of the paring of apples will remove most of the stains caused by preparing ink, also if it be washed out or sopped up from the carpet with cold wa ter when it is spilled, can be almost entirely removed.
