Major's Court. The only case before the Mayor's Court yesterday was that of a colored man by the name of Joseph Fowle, who was charged with disorderly conduct. Judgment for the costs, which were afterwards remitted by Mayor Wilson and defendant discharged.

In explanation of the above, Fowle states that two policemen, who he alleges were influenced by personal animosity against him, forced him to his house about 12 o'clock on Tuesday night and ordered him out of his bed, saying that they had been sent to arrest him. Upon being questioned as to their having a warrant for their proceedings in the matter one of them remarked that he had the document; but he failed to produce it. They further stated that they were acting under authority from the Captain of the night force. Upon reaching the Guard House, however, Captain Nixon stated that he knew nothing about the matter, but recognized Fowle to appear before the Mayor's Court yesterday morning. He attended, according to promise, but the two policemen were not present to prefer any charge against him.

If policemen are allowed to use their official positions to gratify personal spite, they will not be of much service as guardians of the public peace.

Money Orders. The money order system between the United States and the German Empire will go into operation on Tuesday, October 1st. The maximum of each order is fixed when issued in the United States at fifty dollars in currency, and the rates of commission are as follows: For any sum not exceeding \$5-5 cents; for above \$5, but not exceeding \$10-50 cents; for above \$10, but not exceeding \$20-75 cents; for above \$20, but not exceeding \$30-75 cents; for above \$30, but not exceeding \$40-81 cents; for above \$40, but not exceeding \$50-81 cents.

Orders may be obtained and any information in reference to the system upon application at the postoffice.
