Money Orders. The money order system between the United States and the German Empire will go into operation on Tuesday, October 1st. The maximum of each order is fixed when issued in the United States at fifty dollars in currency, and the rates of commission, as follows: For any sum not exceeding \$5-5 cents; for above \$5, but not exceeding \$10-25 cents; for above \$10, but not exceeding \$20-50 cents; for above \$20, but not exceeding \$30-75 cents; for above \$30, but not exceeding \$40-\$1; for above \$40, but not exceeding \$50 \$1 25.

A Hurricane at Sea-Narrow Escape of the Barque Ansdell.

Capt. Robt. B. Key, of the Barque Ansdell, just arrived from Cardiff, reports that on the 27th of August, in lat. 26:41 North, long. 59:16 West, passed the three-masted Schooner Maggie McNeal, bound South, there being a strong wind from East Southeast at the time, with heavy clouds, sea high and much rain.

On the 28th a hurricane was experienced. the wind veering from East to Northeast, then changing to North, then to Northwest and finally to the West, going round and round the compass. Latitude at noon 24:51 North; long. 61:22 West. On the 29th there was a complete hurricane, the wind still going round and round the compass, with much rain, the sea running mountain high, and the ship scudding all the time under the two lower topsails and fore topmast staysail, the lower' and upper topsail yards lashed together, the ship straining and making a great quantity of water, while all the running rigging was breaking and flying like whip-cord. At noon lat. 26:17 North; long. 58:24 West. On the 30th the hurricane was steady at the South, with mountains of sea, the ship laboring and straining the hull and masts, while the yards and decks were constantly under water, there being great danger of the vessel's foundering. At noon lat. 29:28 North: long. 58:43 West. On the 31st there was less wind at noon, but the sea very high, the wind being South by Southwest, with much rain. This gang has been operating in a number of counties in the western portion of this State for the past twelve months, and the authorities have been put to much trouble to get upon their track. 
