Meeting of Business Men-Relief of Money Market.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 21. A meeting of business men of Philadelphia was held at the Commercial Exchange, today, to discuss the proposed re-issuance of forty-four million dollars in legal tenders. The only business done was the submission of resolutions by Geo. Fox, to the effect that the business men of this city would endorse a continuance of Secretary Boutwell's former policy, viz: "Purchase of bonds from time to time to relieve the money market. The resolutions were referred to a committee to report at next meeting, on call of Chairman of Resolutions.
