INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 22.

At the suggestion of the Chairman of the Liberal Committee, the members of the State Committees came together here this evening for a comparison of views and the adoption of some vigorous action for the retention and increase of Hendricks' majority in November.

A feeling of very general enthusiasm was excited by the unanimity and vigor with which a renewal of the fight was determined.

The testimony from all sides is conclusive that a great cause shall not be put in jeopardy through party prejudice or personal whim.

The excellent reports from the Illinois border are largely instrumental in strengthening the hands of the Indiana Liberals, and the effect will be an agreeably increased vote in the remote border counties.
