#### MORE DAVENPORTISM ALIAS GRANTISM.

A Citizen Denied Prompt Trial by a United States Commissioner-Citizens to be Kept From Voting. [From the New York Tribune of Wednes-

Charles Hussey, charged with violating the Federal Election law, in ejecting from his house a Deputy-Marshal, who said he had come to take the census, appeared yesterday at 11 A. M. in Commissioner Davenport's rooms in the United States building in Chambers street. He was accompanied by his witnesses and his counsel, Messrs. Casserly and Major, of the firm of Rudd, Casserly & Ma-

Commissioner Davenport came in about 12:30 P. M., and said: I can't go on with this examination to-day, because I have a case against a man who is in jail.

Mr. Major-We are ready for trial; we have a right to be tried, and we demand it. It is time, Sir, that both you and your Deputy Marshals should learn that citizens have some rights which you are bound to respect. Mr. Hussey was arbitrarily arrested and brought before you, and you filed his trial for to-day; now, I don't propose to have it put off. Mr. Hussey is innocent of the offence charged, and he is entitled to a trial, and to a discharge. I therefore again demand that this case go on.

Commissioner Davenport—I shall adjourn this case until next week Thursday. Mr. Major-I protest against such action on your part. It is arbitrary and unheard of.

Commissioner Davenport (very insolently)-You are not entitled to an examination; and if one is granted, it will be a mere act of courtesy on my part. A man out on bail is not entitled to an examination because his case can, if the District Attorney desires it, be sent before the Grand

Mr. Casserly-you deny us an examination; now, are we to understand that a man's house can be invaded and that, if he puts the invader out and is arrested for it, he can't be examined until you see fit?

Assistant District Attorney Davis -Perhaps the gentleman doesn't understand that a man in jail has preference over a man who is out on bail. Commissioner Davenport-I don't know what he means, but I know that I shall adjourn this case until next week Thursday. Mr. Major-That will be until after

election. Commissioner Davenport-I can't

help that. Mr. Kirk (Hussey's bondsman)-What if I surrender Mr. Hussey in the meantime?

Commissioner Davenport-Then I shall send him to jail. This case is now adjourned.
