He was noticed by the colored man in the wagon, soon after leaving the same, to forsake the road and go into the woods. Since that time nothing was heard of him and his mysterious disappearance had begun to excite much curiosity among the people in that vicinity, when, on Friday last, his dead body was discovered in the woods not far from where he disappeared just two weeks before. There was no indication of violence, but the body was much decayed. A jury of inquest was to have been held yesterday and our informant was confident that a verdict of death from natural causes would be returned.
