"Take a bucket two-thirds full of boiling water: add a handful of camomile flowers; envelope the head of the horse and the bucket with a blanket; keep horse covered with a blanket: and when he shows sign of sweating put on another blanket, which will increase the perspiration, and when in a good perspiration take off the two wet blankets and put on dry ones. Use eight drops of Aconite in half an ounce of water every six hours."
