The Horse Distemper. Pref Law of Cornell thinks that the disease that afflicts our horses is the result of poisonous organic matter in the atmosphere; and says that for the past few months butchers have had unusual difficulty in preserving meats, and hence there must be a great growth of fungi from ill-preserved mest. The disease is an old one, and has been traced back four hundred and fifteen years before Christ. It will be very pleasant for men who have lost fine horses to know that they died of a venerable and therefore eminently respectable disorder, and none of your modern, new-fangled distempers. It appeared thirty-nine times in the fifteenth century alone. The horse is a finely organized animal; the surface exposed to the air in his lungs is about 1,000 square feet; and, since he is so often overworked and badly housed, it is not strange that disthis morning at 11, and to-night at 7:30 eases affect him with peculiar severity. Prof. Law recommends burning sulphur on a shovel in stables as a disinfectant, but horses need not be shut up except in bad

The question of reading the communica-tion was discussed by Messrs. Waring, Grandy, King, Stilley and Harris. The reading of the communication ordered, which communication was from M. A. Biedsoe, President of the Board of Directors of the Penitentiary, addressed to the General Assembly, and explained at length why the Governor had failed to transmit to this Assembly the report of the said institu-tion. Mr. Bledsoe stated that on the 13th inst. he caused to be transmitted to the Sovernor the annual report of the Board. hat on the ensuing day the report was returned to him with a verbal message from the Governor "that the report was not pro-perly addressed, that it was not accompanied with a vote transmitting it to him, and that he objected to the subject matter of the report, and did not consider it respectful to nim," but failed to state in what particular. On the 16th the report was again sent to the Governor, accompanied with a note. On the 18th inst. the report was again returned to the Board. The letter to the General Assembly states that the Board intends no discourtesy to the Governor, but beg to be allowed to say that they do not recognize the right of the Governor to dictate their reports, only considering the Governor the medium through which to transmit them to the General Assembly, and they believed they had fully complied with the Constitu-tional requirements. Having failed to reach the General Assembly through the regular channel, occasioned the sending of these documents to the President of the
