President Morehead in a chair. Mr. James T. Morehead—A bill to amend chapter 199, laws of 1871-72, looking to contracts. Referred to Committee on Corporations.

Mr. Love—A bill in relation to mining and manufacturing companies. Referred to the Committee on Education. That the system of common schools be examined into.

The President submitted to the Senate a communication from the President of the Penitentiary Board of Directors, accompanied with the annual report of that Board, which had been sent to the Governor but refused by him.

The letter of Mr. Bidson concludes: "It is believed an investigation of the Penitentiary and of the Governor's 'reputed facts' will develop the fact that much of the responsibility for the consequences resulting therefrom, is traceable to the Governor and others who lend but a willing ear to the misrepresentations of unscrupulous persons."
