HORACE GREELEY IS DEAD!

Our pen walks over the page at funeral pace. It is with difficulty we frame words of announcement. Our head and heart bow at the great stroke that has fallen on the profession and the nation; yea, on the world and the time. Horace Greeley, the Journalist, the

Thinker, the Patriot, the Philanthropist, is no more!

Mr. Greeley was easily first of all the editors who ever lived. He was one of the foremost thinkers of the country. But it is as the Emotional Man of the world's history that the great Tribune will be known, admired and most fondly cherished. If his mind was Colossus, his heart was the World. He had an ideal lofty and grand in the things of the mind, lovely and chaste in the things of the soul. With all his rough energy, and by the power of an unrivalled will, he lived up to his ideal as closely as a mortal may. In the hour of his death, and in the deed of dying, he nobly illustrated his brave life's pure and exalted teachings. He died, and the answer was given across the field of the centuries to Pilate's interrogatory, "What is Truth?"

A country, a world, sorrows for Greeley, dead. The friend of humanity, the champion of right, the martyr to truth-illustrious among the renowned Chiefs of Human Thought and Human Action-the peer of the proudest, the equal of the noblest-America weeps at his grave, and mourns in her loss, the loss of the typical American.

A Sun reporter visited the bedside of Mr. Greeley, Wednesday night From his report we gather the following facts relating to the causes of the untimely death of the distinguish ed journalist and philosopher:

Dr. Brown-Sequard, the great Paris physician who cured the Hon. Charles Sumner, Dr. Brown and Dr. Choate, were in consultation. They defined Mr. Greeley's disease as an organic affection of the brain, the result of physical prostration consequent upon his unremitting attendance at the bedside of his dying wife. He went weeks and weeks

more than an hour a night; oftentimes and for long periods without food. His affection for Mrs. Greeley was deep seated and sincere, and the probability of her approaching loss kept his mind in a continual state of exhaustive excitement. Since her death, the immense power of endurance which was so severely tested during her long sickness and suffering, suddenly gave way and a powerful reaction set in which left him completely enervated and prostrate. His nervous system was utterly

The nerves of his stomach were first affected to such a degree that he could not retain his food. Since then he has gradually failed. On the day before yesterday he lost consciousness. His last coherent words were:

"The country is gone, the Tribune is gone, and I am gone. From this it would seem that Mr. Greeley himself had a premonition of his approach-

THE OVERWORK THAT DID IT.

The representatives of the press, who accompanied Mr. Greeley on his journeys in New England and in the West in August New England and in the West in August and September last, say that he did not average six hours a night in bed while making those great journeys and delivering the wonderful series of speeches which so happily surprised his friends.
