He made various purchases of property for the Company with moneys of his own, the benefit of which accrued to the road. Upon the construction placed by Mr. Watson on his account he was charged with all the moneys, and hence he believed the properties in question belonged to him; and if they were now transferred he should be credited with their value. Owing to the state in which he was compelled to leave his accounts on withdrawal from the Company and loss of his account book, some things remained unexplained.
