### An Old Decument.

We were shown yesterday, by Mr. J. J O'Brien, the original copy of a receipt for insurance on the "Brig Peggy John Mill. bound on a voyage from Newbern, in North Carolina, to the West Indies, and back again to Newbern," which is dated Newbern, 27th Jan., 1755, and signed Charles Adams. It was found among the ruins of an old house at Rock Hill, near this city, and bears the impress of age, though a portion of the writing is as perfectly distinct as it could have been the day it was written, one hundred and eighteen years ago.


