

The House of Representatives is so unused to bold and courageous action by its members that it was very much astonished, probably, when "Gen Hawley "called names" on the bill to pay the expenses of contestants for seats. This bill takes about \$150,-1000 from the public funds to pay the expenses of men who set up claims to seats in the House, whether they get those seats or not. On this proposition, of course, interested contestants voted affirmatively; and when Gen. Hawley called out their names and cited the law against them, they were astounded. Remodeling of the Seamen's Home. At last we are to have a house of refuge, a home for seamen, that will be convenient and comfortable and an ornament to the city. The plans by which it will be erected, and which are understood as having been adopted, reflect much credit upon the judgment and taste of the committee having charge of the matter. A want long felt is here supplied. The old building, the delapidated condition of which has for sometime been an eye-sore to the community, is to be torn down and a new one erected upon its site. The elevations and plans as to style and

convenience in interior arrangements are complete. The new "Home" is to be in size 61 feet square. The front on Front street will be of iron and in the Corinthian style of architecture. The lower floor on this side will be occupied as stores, so arranged that there can be four, two, or one, as demand may dictate. It is expected to be the handsomest front for either wholesale or retail business in the city. The main entrance to the "Home" will be on Front street, while the sailors will enter through the tower on Dock street.

The second floor, on Front street, will be divided into offices, while the balance of the floor is designed for the keeper of the "Home" and his family. A part of the third floor will be con

veniently arranged for the special accom-modation of officers. A smoking and reading room for seamen will be located on the same floor, fronting on Dock street. The general dining room will be large and commodious and will be located on the South

side. The fourth floor will be arranged entirely for the accommodation of seamen. A large tank for the reception of rain water will be arranged so as to furnish a plen-

tiful supply of water for the wash room and for all other purposes, while the waterclosets on every floor will be so connected with the tank that they will act as their own disinfectants.

The "Home" and "Bethel" are designed in style as two separate institutions. The "Bethel" presents in the elevation a beautiful front, the part designed for public worship to have Gothic doors and windows, the windows above to be capped with what is known among architects as "angle-hoods,"
