THE DISASTER OFF DUNGENESS. More particulars reach us from the awful calamity which befell the emigrant ship off the English headlands. Ninety-seven persons in all are known to have been saved. An investigation into the matter is being had. The North Fleet was lving at anchor at the time the collision occurred. Her cargo consisted of railway iron.

Three hundred and twenty-one persons were drowned, including the captain of the ill-fated vessel. The name of the steamer which ran into the ship has not yet been ascertained, but she is believed to have been a Spanish vessel bound from Antwerp, or a Portugese craft. A telegram of yesterday evening says it is thought that a steamship found sunk near the place where the accident occurred was the other colliding vessel. The Spanish steamer Marillo is believed to be lost

Thus the horror deepens. Dungeness, pear which the North Fleet foundered, is a headland of England forming the southern extremity of the county of Kent, and projecting into the English Channel about 34 miles south-southeast of the town of Lydd. It has a fort and a lighthouse; the latter is 92 feet in hight.

#### Protection from Fire.

The following letter from Ex-Mayor Silas N. Martin to His Honor, Mayor Wilson, was laid before the Board of Aldermen at their meeting on Friday night. The question of an adequate protection from the ravages of fire is an important one at this juncture and the suggestions of Mr. Martin who has given the matter much study, are worthy of consideration:

WILMINGTON, N. C., Jan. 20th, 1873. Hon. James Wilson, Mayor. .

DEAR SIR:-The recent disastrous fires in our city give warning that further pre-ventatives must be provided. I have an idea which I think would make our fire

department measurably perfect. 1st. Procure 2,000 feet of best hose and distribute among the different steam en-

2d. Purchase a River Steamer or Tug. place upon it a first-class force pump and one thousand or fifteen hundred feet of hose. Let the boat be kept in readiness to move from point to point. Two men would be sufficient to man and control it. A small steamer with hose and fixtures would not cost more than a steam fire engine and its equipment. It would be able to move from any point to any other with ease, commanding on both sides of the river all the exposures within reach of the hose. An inexhaustible supply would be always at command. The boat would carry its own hose and be prepared to get to work at very short notice. Much of the valuable produce is stored outdoors and much exposed; it could always be reached. Millions of dollars of value might be saved in case of a great fire. The steamer could also be used to tow flats and vessels out of

On the whole, after some deliberation, I'think this plan is the best to thoroughly protect our water front. These kind of steamers in London and New York are considered of very great value.
