## DEATH OF MAURY.

Commodore Matthew F. Maury died at Lexington, Va., yesterday at 1 o'clock.

This is painful intelligence. He was the South's greatest scientist and probably the most distinguished writer of the period in the department of physical geography. Some notice of him is given in the telegraphic announcement of his death. The lateness of the hour precludes a more elaborate sketch of the distinguished dead.

Death has cut short a great and nseful life. At the time he was taken ill Commodore Maury was engaged in the noble work of developing the resources of his beloved South, and had he lived a few years longer would doubtless have enjoyed the fruits and rewards of all his toiling and selfsacrifice, Maurys are as great benefactors as Lees. The South will ever cherish the memory of her learned and patriotic son.

State debt, providing for biennial sessions of the General Assembly and biennial elections for members and State officers; fixing the pay of members at \$300 per session and ten cents mileage; abolishing the office of Superintendent of Public Works; reducing the number of Supreme Court Judges to four; reducing the judicial districts to nine; providing for the re of circuits, so that no judge shall ride the of circuits, so that no judge shall ride the same circuit twice in one year; re-establishing the old term "precinets" instead of "townships;" striking out the provisions requiring a tax to be levied for the payment of the interest and principal of the State debt; striking out the requirement for a census of the State in 1875, &c.
