REPORTS FROM COMMITTEES.

Reports from standing committees were presented by Messrs. Todd, Merrimon and Murchison, on the bill for the improvement of the Public Road between the States of North Carolina and Virginia.

Scotch Fair of Richmond county.

Mr. Ellis, of Catawba, introduced a bill to repeal sections 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10th and 11th of chap. 3 Rev. Code entitled Agricultural and Zoological.

Mr. Worth called up, under a suspension of the rules.
