MATTERS AT WASHINGTON.

Pool for the Cabinet-Grant to Come South in March-Etc., Etc.

Special Telegrams to the Petersburg Appeal.]

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. The Georgia delegation succeeded to-day in having an interview with the President, and presented their Senator Pool to a Cabinet position, The delegation express themselves as fully satisfied with the result of their interview. After a general conversation on Southern affairs, the President informed the delegation that it was his intention to make a tour of the Southern States, leaving here about the 20th of March, via Richmond, Raleigh, Columbia, Charleston, Savan-nah, &c., to New Orleans, and would

be accompanied by all the members of his Cabinet. The House is evidently not in the

humor to permit any discussion of the bill for refunding the cotton tax. It was agreed in the Committee of structions of the committe, should report adversely upon the bills for re-funding of the tax, that liberal time should be allowed for discussion. Mr. Dawes reported the bill to-day, and asked to have Friday next fixed for their consideration; whereupon another New England member, Mr. Hale, stepped in with an objection and Mr. Dawes failed to obtain the necessary two-thirds vote in support of his motion. Hence it is not probable that there will be any discussion of the question, for it can only be done by unanimous con-sent or a suspension of the rules; and the action of to-day demonstrated that neither can be had. The opponents of the bill are fearful that a full discussion will develope a strong sentiment in its favor.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3, 1873. The Southern Republicans are working earnestly in the effort to secure representation in the Cabinet. Many Republicans from the Southern States are moving in behalf of Senator Pool, and between now and the fourth of March next they hope to have petitions here from nearly every State in the South urging the claims of that section to representation in

The South Carolinians are urging the claims of Senator Sawyer, while the Virginians have pronounced a decided preference for Judge Hughes. But it is believed all the States will finally unite upon Senator Pool.
