The Senate resolution to refund to the Wilmington & Weldon R. R. Company \$1,987.23 collected as taxes on the road in the years 1870-'71 and '72, was rejected by the House on Wednesday, by a vote of 30 to 5.

The unsightly porch or platform in front of Messrs. Yopp & Woolvin's, corner of Princess and Second streets, has been removed and a new one placed in its stead, which, not being so wide, gives more room on the sidewalk.

Mysterious Disappearance. An old colored man, by the name of Henry Edwards, who has officiated as a porter in the tobacco store now occupied by Mr. David Pigott for the past thirteen or fourteen years, has mysteriously disappeared.
