The U. S. Senators.

The Senate of the United States of the 43d Congress convened Tuesday, at Washington. Henry Wilson, of Massachusetts, whose term as Vice President began on that day, presides. The oldest Senator is Simon Cameron, born in 1799, and the two youngest Mr. Dorsey, born in 1841, and Dr. Conover, 1840. Mr. Cameron is the only Senator over 70 years of age. Forty-six of the Senators are lawyers; five are interested in railroads; four are farmers; three are physicians; two are journalists; two clergymen; Mr. Sprague is a manufacturer, Mr. Chandler a merchant. Mr. Ames an army officer, Mr. Clayton a civil engineer, Mr. Jones a miner, Pinchback a waiter, and Messrs. Buckingham, Caldwell, T. W. Ferry, Gilbert and West, engaged in general business. Senators Gordon, Ransom and Alcorn were Generals in the Confederate army during the war. Messrs. Alcorn, Anthony, Boreman, Brownlow, Buckingham, Clayton, Fenton, Hamlin, L. M. Morrill, Morton, Ramsey, Sprague, Oglesby and Stevenson, have in the past been Governors of their respective States.

About two hours later flames were discovered bulging out at the side of the kitchen in the rear of the residence of Mr. Jos. H. Neff, only a few feet from the coppersmith shop in which the previous fire occurred. The discovery was made by some of the employees of Messrs. Hart & Bailey, who soon had two streams on the fire, one from the steam and the other from the hand-pump, when the flames were promptly extinguished.

The kitchen alluded to is not much used. and it is supposed that the fire originated from a deposit of hot ashes from a stove. Fortunately, there was no occasion for an alarm to be sounded in either instance, though it is likely there would have been a big excitement had the facts been known on the streets.

On His Travels.

The Raleigh Sentinel of yesterday has the following in reference to James Kennedy, the old man who reported that he was knocked down and robbed on the road near this city on Friday last: "A man, apparently 60 years of age, came to our city Monday, (and we know how very cold that day was) minus a coat, and without a cent. He says he was knocked down and robbed of his money and coat a few days since, at or near North East on the Wilmington & Weldon road. He hails from Rochester, N. Y.; he says he is a cigar maker, and would do any honorable work for a living in his distressed condition. Some kindhearted people here clothed him and procured for him a free passage as far as Weldon. The man told the same tale in Wil-

whenever the same shall be required for disbursement according to law. Ordered further, That the Chairman be and is hereby authorized to prepare instructions and blanks for the use of school committees and teachers, and distribute the same, in order that the new law and manner

of procedure may be understood. Orderea that the Clerk of this Board notify the School Committees in each township to make their estimates for the payment of teachers and assistance required in obtaining sites and building school houses, required by section 26 of the Act of General Assembly, ratified January 26th. 1873, said estimates to be made for the year beginning July 1st, 1873, and ending June 30th, 1874. It is required that said esti-

mates be handed in by or before April 1st. It was ordered that the sum of two thousand dollars be paid over to the School Committee of the City of Wilmington, or the City Treasurer, in the discretion of the Chairman, out of the school money now in the hands of the County Treasurer, for the payment of teachers amounts due or which may become due, for services rendered and to be rendered before June 30th, 1878. It was ordered that the Chairman be and

hereby authorized to procure the service of some competent person to serve the notices, as required by this Board, on the several School Committees and Teachers, at such compensation as he may deem advisable. Meeting adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman. an hreavy
