Why is there such great difference in the price of the same quality of peanuts sold in New York and Wilmington? A few days ago a car load of peanuts, shipped by rail from Rocky Point, sold in New York at one dollar and twenty-five cents per bushel, free of drayage and all other expenses, except commission for selling, and it was a com-mon article. Our peanut farmers cannot sell this quality of peanuts in Wilmington for more than ninety cents per bushel, and it only costs eleven cents a bushel to trans-port peanuts from Rocky Point direct by railroad to New York. The peanut farmers are becoming discouraged and dissatisfied at this disparity of prices between Wilmington and New York. The commission merchants of Wilmington ought to explain as well as reform and correct errors and abuses. All the farmers ask is justice.
