NOTES.

Rev. Dr. Wm. H. McGuffey, of the University of Virginia, is critically ill.

The grocery and dwelling of Mr. Fagerty, in Alexandria, Va., was burned Monday. Loss, \$5,000.

Messrs. John W. H. Porter and M. W. Conannon will publish in Portsmouth, on or about the first of April, a morning paper, neutral in politics, to be called the Portsmouth Enterprise.

An unknown party, probably mistaking the youth for some other person about 7 o'clock Monday night, attempted to assassinate Charles Dudley Bragg, son of Mr. Jas. L. Bragg, in front of the latter's residence, 520 8th street, between Clay and Leigh, Richmond, Va. Bragg was shot, but not dangerously.

On Sunday morning before day-break the rooms of Senators Thomas and Rixey, Nos. 87 and 89 Exchange Hotel, Richmond, were entered and robbed. Judge Thomas lost \$65, and Mr. Rixey lost a valuable gold watch and chain and \$17 in money. Judge Thomas lost a large sum by robbery in Washington on inauguration day.

Beaver Creek Factory, near Fayetteville, has 61 looms, 2,700 spindles, 24 cards, and when fully in operation will turn out 80,000 yards of sheeting per month and use 850 bales of cotton per annum. With its two factories the Beaver Creek Company will be a \$6 to turn out 160,000 yards of sheeting per month and will use 1,700 bales of cotton per annum. The Rockfish factory will be in operation in a few days.

A singular law suit has been brought in Boston. Whether the Russian Duke Alex was entertained in Music Hall, in 1871, the bust of Benjamin Franklin was knocked from its pedestal, and struck a lady on the head, inflicting injuries which for some time required medical treatment. The injured woman has now sued the city for \$10,000 damages. Two Aldermen, members of the Committee in charge of the festival, have also been personally sued.

Speaking of the late mysterious murder in Brooklyn the Tribune says: The supposition that Mr. Goodrich may have taken his own life is now generally abandoned. No man, after shooting himself mortally behind one ear, could have changed his pistol to the other hand and shot himself mortally again behind the other ear, to say nothing of a third mortal wound which appears to have been fired from the front. Neither could he, after receiving any one of these wounds, have washed and dried his face, and hung up the bloody cloth over the sink. The absence of his watch and purse would alone be strong confirmation of the theory of murder if it could be proved that he had taken his own life; but of this, though it seems to be taken for granted, there is thus far no evidence.

Monument to Stonewall Jackson.

The Southern Home learns from Gen. Fendleton that the English monument has been finished, but has not been sent over owing to the unsettled state of things in this country. This monument is an expression of respect and admiration from the lead-

ing members of the British Parliament for the lamented hero, who died for the Constitution of his country. Among the contributors to the monument were Hon. Mr. Gregory, now Governor-General of Ceylon, and Hon. Berrisford Hope, long a leader in the councils of the nation.

Sudden Death. Mr. Daniel L. Savage, who resided in that portion of the city known as "Brooklyn," died very suddenly yesterday morning, about 6 o'clock. He had been ill with pneumonia for about eight or ten days, but had so far recovered that he was able to go about the house and lot. After breakfast yesterday morning he took a walk in the garden, but after remaining out a few minutes returned to the house, entering which he requested his mother to open the doors and windows, remarking that the room was very warm. At the same moment he showed signs of weakness and called to his wife for a chair, but before she could get to him he had fallen to the floor. His wife and mother, becoming alarmed, called for assistance from the street and a messenger was immediately dispatched for his physician, who had discontinued his visits. It was evident from the first, however, to the friends who hastened to his side, that he would have no further need for an earthly physician, and in less than ten minutes after entering the house he had breathed his last. It is supposed that his death was caused by an attack of apoplexy. Deceased was one of the oldest engineers on the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He was a devoted member of the Masonic fraternity and will be buried with the honors of that institution this afternoon at 4 o'clock, the funeral to take place from the First Baptist Church.

A Quick Trip. It will be remembered that I made some allusion in our last to the number of India rubber balloons which were sent up on Monday, one of which had a card attached to it, and we remarked that it would probably be heard from. Notwithstanding this prediction, we were not a little surprised yesterday when informed by G. Z. French, Esq., that this year balloon fell in his field at Rocky Point, about sixteen miles from this city, at 3 o'clock that day, or, as will be seen by the following dispatch written on the card alluded to, just one-half hour after it was put up in front of Harris' News Stand in this city, having travelled at the rate of a little over thirty miles an hour. The Republican Ward meetings for the nomination of candidates for Aldermen took place last night. In the First Ward, after organization and balloting for some time the meeting broke up in a row, several fights occurring, but without serious results. The Wilson men claim the election, but the friends of Canada insist that there was no election, and that there must be another meeting called. In this connection we learn that the Committee will meet at the City Court Room to-day at 12 o'clock to consider the question of calling another meeting, to be held in the day time.

In the Second Ward the meeting was a very quiet one and the business was disposed of very quickly. Geo. Z. French, Esq., was called to the chair, when the balloting was proceeded with, resulting as follows:

Banks' first choice for Mayor reported to be Rev. Wm. H. Banks; second, James Wilson. Hankins for Wilson. First Ward not decided.
