MADRID.

There has been a revolutionary demonstration, if not an accomplished revolution, within the last two days at Madrid. Castelar, Minister of Foreign Affairs and Salmeron, Minister of Justice, affirmed at a cabinet meeting on Wednesday that dicipline had been restored in the army and that the Carlists have been checked, but acknowledged that the situation was grave. The Monarchists did not succeed in their outbreak on Thursday. A rumor comes from Paris that the Commune had been declared at Madrid. The Spanish Republicans have more difficulties to contend with than ever fell to the lot of a people-Carlists, Constitutional monarchists and red republicans, all bent on making the chaos as pitiable and complete as possible. There are two or three men of very distinguished ability in the Government, but their hands seem to be tied. The politics of Spain at this time may be accurately discribed as volcanic.

Texas-Its Advantages and Disad-A former Wilmingtonian, writing us from Austin, Texas, does not give a very encouraging account of matters and things in the "Lone Star" State. Speaking of the advantages of that section he says that onethird of the labor is required there to make a crop with a much larger yield than in the old States, while wages are better there in coin than they are in the old States in currency. The disadvantages are more numerous The most of the people are wealthy and care but little if anything for the wants and needs of the poorer classes. It requires a great deal of influence to get into business of any kind, and it costs a great deal more to live there than it does in the old States. He has been paying \$7 50 per week in coin for board in a private family in Austin, while clothing and everything else is more expensive than in North Carolina and the other Southern States. The most important objection, however, and one that should be duly considered by persons contemplating a removal to Texas, is the fact that the State is overrun by immigrants.-He says there are more there now than the State is able to take care of, many of whom are loafing around Austin with nothing to do. And this is not because they are disposed to be idle, for our correspondent has seen many good business men who were willing to do anything for a living, who were trying everywhere and could get nothing at all to do. He gives an instance of a man he saw in Houston who said that he was in the Eastern part of the State without money or friends, He inquired of an influential Texau if there was no provision made for strangers with no money when they were sick, who replied there was none; that when a man comes to
