- The "East Carolina" correspond-ence of the Petersburg Index thus describes the terrific storm of Saturday night and day morning, which visited Edge-ibe, Halifax, Wilson, Nash and other unties: The storm raged for an hour. During that hour trees were toru up, or mu-tillated of their foliage. The surface of the earth was fringed and carpeted with the earth was tringed and carpeted with fragmentary verdure. The hail stones va-ried in size from a partridge egg to a man's fist. Shutters were, in some instances, de-molished, wall shingles broken in, and panes of glass shattered into invisible atoms. In portions of Nash, near Squire B. W. Boddy's, birds were killed in the forests. Their screams were heart-rending, and they would seek for protection their greatest en-emy, man. Dumb brutes would mutely appeal for shelter, by hugging dwellings as closely as possible. Calves, lambs and he smaller animals were knocked senseless In Wilson county, hogs, in exposed locali-ties, were stricken dead in their tracks, and everywhere poultry, unprotected, bit the dust. That is, they would, had there been any dust to bite. Lovers of spring fries, chicken salad, and broth are now in sackcloth and ashes. Like Rachel they refuse to be comforted. If the tragedy had been less bloody, it would have been amusing. Each lump of ice was a dead shot, and when it struck a fowl, it keeled over like lightning.


