Soney Bridge.

We were shown yesterday the plan adopted by the late Board of Aldermen for the stone bridge across the railroad on Fourth street. The bridge will be fifty feet wide, with a thirty-six feet span, a drive thirtythree feet wide and sidewalks on each side seven feet wide. The abutments are to be afty feet long, nine feet wide at base and five feet wide at top, the wingwales to be forty-five feet long from face of abutments, the whole to be built of substantial masonr of sand granite. The arch is to be of cut stone, with a parapet wall of eighteen nches thick and three and a half feet high above sidewalks, covered with a capping six inches thick and projecting over the wall on each side. The sidewalks and carringeway are to be graded and macademized with small fragments of rock, brick or coarse gravel to a depth of not less than six nches, the sidewalks to have curb-stones raised one foot above the carriageway. It will be a good substantial bridge when built, and we hope to chronicle its early
