THE FLOOD.

The Tar and Roanoke on a Rampage—serious Damage to the Crops. [Raleigh News of Yesterday.] From the East, West and Central countries we hear the same reports, and it is beyond our power to form any idea of the hundreds of thousands of dollars of private property which have been destroyed.

A gentleman just from Halifax reports even greater damage along the course of the turbulent Roanoke. The water rose higher in that river than was ever known before.

Near Weldon, the plantation of Col. N. M. Long, and those of Jno. Long and John Long, Jr., have sustained serious losses. These gentlemen had each several hundred acres in cotton, corn and oats, which were under water for several days.

All the Scotland Neck plantations, lying in the vicinity of the river, came in for their share of the disaster. At Hill's Ferry, on the plantation formerly owned by Maj. John Devereux, of this city, the dwelling was raised four feet and a half above the ground.

A letter from Nash says the hail in some sections of that county on Sunday evening last was the severest ever known. The stones were as large as hickory nuts and some of them remained on the ground until 11 o'clock next day.

We learn from a letter received by a gentleman in this city that there are several cases of small pox at Rocky Point, there being as many as six in one family. It has raged mostly among the colored people, but a number of whites have also had it.

We learn that the rains have been very heavy in Robeson for a day or two past. In some sections of the county scarcely any crops will be made, and everywhere they have been materially injured.
