OBITUARY.

JAMES W. WALLACK.

The death Saturday night on a sleeping car south of IRichmond of this eminen actor and manager has been recorded in our columns. Some sketch of his life is appro priate, as he may be justly regarded as one of the very ablest of American actors. About a year ago Mr. Wallack was seized with a pulmonary complaint, and the disease asserted itself so rapidly that when he went to Aiken for his health, about two months ago, one lung was already gone. He apparently improved by his residence in the South and thought himself strong enough to go back to New York, which he was attempting to do when he died. Mr. Wallack was the son of the late Henry Wallack and a nephew of the distinguished actor James William Wallack. Mr. Wallack made his first appearance at the National Theatre, corner of Leonard and Church streets, which was under the managemen of his uncle. He played in England and Australia, his most remarkable perform-Mask." Later he "starred" the country, without pecuniary success, with E. L. Davenport. Returning to Wallack's Theatre, New York he played his great Nancy. Mr. Wallack continued to play at this theatre for some time, making a hit in the character of Henry Dunbar, which drew large houses for many nights. The Cholera-Sanitary Precautions. We see by our exchanges that all the cities along the Mississippi and Ohio are alarmed by the appearance of cholera in New Orleans, and are busily making preparations to resists its inroads by adopting thorough sanitary measures. There is now no doubt that the disease prevailing in New Orleans, from which there were as many as eleven deaths reported as early as the week ending May 10th, is the epidemic cholera of the unmistakable Asiatic type, While there may be no actual danger of the disease spreading to any great extent and it may possibly not get beyond the limits of New Orleans, still, it behooves other cities, on the Atlantic coast as well as on the rivers mentioned, to use every possible pre-

caution to prevent its introduction. To speak more particularly of our own city, we think it to the interest of our citizens at large, to say nothing of their duty in the premises, to give earnest attention to the requirements of the Health Ordinance published elsewhere in this paper. To preserve the health of the city during the summer months, cleanliness of the body, and cleanliness in our streets, alleys, cellars and lots is absolutely essential. Let every stagnant pool and every filthy locality be reported forthwith to the authorities; let the cellars and lots be cleansed at once, and not wait until the latter part of June to do it, and we need have no apprehensions of danger from the pestilence that is already stalking through the land. All filth and garbage taken from private lots should be removed to the street as early as possible in the day, so the city carts can have ample time to take it away.

Health Ordinance.

LL CELLARS, EXCAVATIONS, OR OPEN spaces, under any building in which water at y time stagnates or rises, or which are damp, and which foul and unwholesome air is generated or or some other imperishable substance. And all lots on which water runains and stagnates, or which are generally wet and damp, and all lots sunken below the level of the next adjacent street or alley, and from which there is no suitable drain or gutter, of a permanent character, sufficient readily to vent water from the same, shall, upon like notification and requirement (which it shall be the duty of the Mayor to give), be filled up by the ewners in the manner aforesaid, or so drained by gutters, eniverts or drains as to be kept free from water or dampness.

Every person falling to comply with the foregoing provisions of this section, after notification and requirement from the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars for each and every day of such failure; and, moreover, shall pay all the costs and expenses of filling up or draining as aforesaid, which, upon such failure, the Mayor shall cause to be done at the expense of the city.

All occupants of houses with cellars, and if there he no occupants, then the owners, shall cause all dirt, filth and rubbish to be removed from such cellars, and the same to be cleaned and whitewashed,

dirt, filth and rubbish to be removed from such cellars, and the same to be cleansed and whitewashed,
whenever and as often as they shall be notified and
required by the Mayor so to do.

All occupants, and if there be no occupants, then
the owners, of all stores, shops and warehouses,
shall remove therefrom all fish, beef, pork, hides or
other matter or articles, whatsoever, which may be
putrid, or offensive to the smell, or may tend to corrupt the atmosphere, and shall ventilate and cleanse
their building whenever notified and required by the
Mayor.

Il persons keeping one or more cows, horses or s within the limits of the city shall keep their oles, yards, pens or enclosures in which such ani-s shall usually stand or be, dry and thoroughly msed, and, once in every formight, they shall ove the filth and offal from the same, beyond limits of the city.
