- The dwelling of a colored man by the name of Betts was entered Monday night and robbed of \$14 50, together with some few other little articles.

- The Norwegian Barque Bella, which arrived at Bremerhaven from this port on the 13th, had been ashore on the Kobbenplate, but sustained no damage.

- The first parade of the Knights of Pythias, in uniform, is looked forward to with a great deal of interest. It is expected to come off in the course of the next two or three weeks.

- Gen. R. E. Colston, of this city, is announced as having arrived at Cairo, Egypt, to assume the duties of a professor in the polytechnic school there, and also that of a Colonel in the Egyptian army.

- The valuable gold necklace, advertised in yesterday's STAR as being lost, was restored to its owner early in the day by the finder, a colored man by the name of Collier Taylor.

- Chicken thieves are coming into vogue again. One of them broke into the rear of Mr. E. W. Weyer's store, corner of Second and Market streets, Monday night, and carried away a coop of chickens belonging to a colored man.

- A swarm of bees made a raid on a confectionary store on Market street yesterday, compelling the proprietor to close his doors for a short time to get rid of them. The Cholera-Sanitary Precautions.

We see by our exchanges that all the cities along the Mississippi and Ohio are alarmed by the appearance of cholera in New Orleans, and are busily making preparations to resist its inroads by adopting thorough sanitary measures.

There is now no doubt that the disease prevailing in New Orleans, from which there were as many as eleven deaths reported as early as the week ending May 10th, is the epidemic cholera of the unmistakable Asiatic type. While there may be no actual danger of the disease spreading to any great extent and it may possibly not get beyond the limits of New Orleans, still, it behooves other cities on the Atlantic coast as well as on the rivers mentioned, to use every possible precaution to prevent its introduction.

To speak more particularly of our own city, we think it to the interest of our citizens at large, to say nothing of their duty in the premises, to give earnest attention to the requirements of the Health Ordinance published elsewhere in this paper. To preserve the health of the city during the summer months, cleanliness of the body, and cleanliness in our streets, alleys, cellars and lots is absolutely essential. Let every stagnant pool and every filthy locality be reported forthwith to the authorities; let the cellars and lots be cleaned at once, and not wait until the latter part of June to do it, and we need have no apprehensions of danger from the pestilence that is already stalking through the land. All filth and garbage taken from private lots should be removed to the street as early as possible in the day, so the city carts can have ample time to take it away.

Health Ordinance.

ALL CELLARS, EXCAVATIONS, OR OPEN spaces, under any building in which water at any time stagnates or rises, or which are damp, and in which foul and unwholesome air is generated or found, shall, upon the notification and requirement of the Mayor (which shall be his duty to give), be filled up by the owners thereof, to the level of the street or alley adjoining thereto, with sand or gravel, or some other impervious substance. And all lots which water remains and stagnates, or which are generally wet and damp, and all lots situated below the level of the next adjacent street or alley, and from which there is no suitable drain or gutter, of a permanent character, sufficient readily to vent water from the same, shall, upon the notification and requirement (which shall be the duty of the Mayor to give), be filled up by the owners in the manner aforesaid, or so drained by gutters, culverts or drains as to be kept free from water or dampness.

Every person failing to comply with the foregoing provisions of this section, after notification and requirement from the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars for each and every day of such failure; and, moreover, shall pay all the costs and expenses of filling up or draining as aforesaid, which, upon such failure, the Mayor shall cause to be done at the expense of the city.

All occupants of houses with cellars, and if there be no occupants, then the owners, shall cause all dirt, filth and rubbish to be removed from such cellars, and the same to be cleaned out and whitewashed, whenever and as often as they shall be notified and required by the Mayor so to do.

All persons keeping one or more cows, horses or dogs within the limits of the city shall keep their stables, yards, pens or enclosures in which such animals shall usually stand or be kept, clean and free from filth, and once in every fortnight, they shall remove the filth and excrement from the same, beyond the limits of the city.

No person shall permit any putrid, noxious or offensive matter or substance of any kind, to remain or be upon the lot or premises occupied by him, but shall immediately remove the same beyond the limits of the city.

All privies or necessary houses, or places used as such, shall be supplied with water, or other fluid, or disinfectant once in every fortnight by the occupant, or, in his absence, by the owner of the lot on which such privy may be.

No owner of any lot shall suffer any Jamestown, or other weeds to grow thereon; but all lots shall be kept free and clear therefrom by the owners.

No person shall place, deposit, throw, pour or convey any dirt, refuse, manure, or other filth, or any matter offensive to the smell or injurious to health; nor shall any person keep, or suffer to be kept, any of the articles or things mentioned in or upon his yard or lot more than twenty-four hours.

Every person violating any of the provisions of the seven last preceding paragraphs of this section shall forfeit and pay twenty dollars.

He will keep four (4) carts or things mentioned in or upon his yard or lot more than twenty-four hours.
