Tillinghast, Secretary—both unanimously.

Rev. J. C. Hunk announced that Christ Church at Rock Hill, would be consecrated by Bishop Atkinson, on Monday, June 2nd, services commencing at 11 o'clock a. m. The Convention then adjourned to Thursday morning at 9 o'clock.

The number of Clergymen and Lay Delegates is fully as large as usual on the first day, and considerable accessions will be made by railway to-night and steamer to-morrow.
