#### Important Decision in Bankrupte; by Judge Bick.

[Greensboro New North State.] Judge Dick in a case from the county of Henderson, has just decided some important questions in bankruptcy, which are the subject of much discussion throughout the

I. He affirms the decision of United States Circuit Court of Missouri in re Beckerford 4 N. B. R. 59, declaring that the uniformity of the bankrupt law is not destroyed by the State exemptions allowed in the 14th section of the Bankrupt Act: and decides that the amendatory act of June 8th 1872, and March 3d 1872, do not change the legal principles announced in that case.

II. That a judgment lien is not a vested right which the Constitution protects from a reasonable alteration by legislative action.

III. He is inclined to doubt whether the recent case of Gunn vs. Barry in the United States Supreme Court overrules the case of Hill vs. Kessler 63, N. C. R.

IV. He decides that the case of Gunn vs. Barry does not affect the homestead rights as declared in the bankrupt law as amended by the Act
