At the annual meeting of the Most Illustrious Grand Council of North Carolina, held yesterday, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year.

Under the present schedule, the night Express train on the Wilmington and Weldon Railway leaves here at 9:40 P. M., and consumes 5 hours and 20 minutes in making the run from Wilmington to Goldsboro, a distance of 84 miles.

The Wilmington Trust Company's Savings Bank has been in operation for some weeks. It allows 6 per cent interest on sums of five dollars and upward.

This body, which was in session here for several days this week, has closed its labors. The Raleigh delegation, with the exception of Mr. Neathery, whose duties as Private Secretary to the Governor called him home earlier than the others, will leave this morning.

The sales of spirits turpentine in the Wilmington market, Tuesday, were at 40 1/2 cts. In Charleston, according to the News and Courier, sellers asked 39 cents and buyers offered 38 cents, with no sales.

The wrecking steamer Brandt was making ready to go to the assistance of the Italian Barque Lorenzo Valerio, which went ashore some weeks since on the shoals near Cedar Inlet, North of Beaufort, in this State, when a telegram was received from Mr. Thomas Thomas by Messrs. Harris & Howell, Agents, yesterday morning, to the effect that the Barque went to pieces during the heavy northeast gale on Saturday night last, the 31st inst.

The turpentine distillery of Mr. B. L. Kellum of Jacksonville, Onslow county, was destroyed by fire on Monday night last, together with a large lot of resin and spirits of turpentine. Mr. Kellum estimates his loss at about \$1,500, upon which there was no insurance. The fire, we learn, was not doubt the work of an incendiary.

Local News. The Garstrang, Thornton, cleared from Liverpool for this port on the 29th ult.

Mr. W. H. Gerken has been appointed Agent in this city for the Fayetteville Steamship.

The alarm of fire this morning about 1 1/2 o'clock, was caused by the burning of the tar-kiln of Mr. J. D. Stanley, in the Southwestern part of the city.

The Board met last night, Mayor Canada in the Chair. The only business brought before the meeting was the petition of Messrs. Munson and Katz in reference to the obstruction of Market Street by market carts, which was read at the last meeting, but no action taken on it.

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Fire in Sumner. The county jail at Sumner, S. C., was destroyed by fire on Tuesday night. The fire was first discovered in the roof of the building and is supposed to have been put there by some of the prisoners. They were removed from the burning building and taken to safe quarters.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF THE CAPE FEAR AND DEEP RIVER NAVIGATION WORKS, at the Executive Office in Raleigh, on the 24th June, 1873, the following resolutions were passed:

1. Resolved, That in accordance with the act of the General Assembly, 1869, 1861, chap. 122, it is deemed advisable to sell the interests of the State of North Carolina in the Cape Fear and Deep River Navigation Works.

2. Resolved, That the same be sold in two sections, viz: 1st, from Fayetteville to Sharp's Field Dam; 2d, from Sharp's Field Dam, including the same, up to the Cape Fear and Deep River to the limits of the original charter.

3. Resolved, That the respective purchasers shall pay one-third of the price of their purchases in cash and the remainder in one and two years from date of sale, with interest from said date, and that the same be secured by satisfactory bond, and a lien on the interests purchased. This not to be made until payment in full.

4. Resolved, That the sale be upon the expressed condition that the respective purchasers shall complete and put in operation, according to the terms of the charter, the portion purchased, as follows, viz: from Fayetteville to Sharp's Field Dam, within 5 years from date of sale, and from Sharp's Field Dam, including the same, to Taylor's Mill in Moore county, within 3 years from said date.

5. Resolved, That H. A. London, Secretary, and B. I. Howze, Attorney of the Board, be authorized to make said sale at Lockville, in Chatham county, on the 27th day of July, 1873.
